CYBERCRIME & THE DARK WEB

Surface web \rightarrow Deep web \rightarrow

- Open to everyone
- What we use everyday
- The Internet provides quick, easy, remote communication methods
- 500x the size of the surface web
- Restricted access
- Legit purposes that require anonymity

Dark web

- Purposefully hidden
- Makes illegal activity easier

The dark web provides heightened anonymity through cryptocurrency, TOR, onion encryption, data obfuscation, and more

RATIONAL CHOICE THEORY

A criminological theory based on the assumptions that people are:

- 1. Rational
- 2. Have free will
- 3. Have utilitarian beliefs

Such that, people will reason their decisions to maximize benefits and minimize costs

Historically, this theory has been used to explain street crime, but it can be used to explain **cybercrime** as well

The dark web provides a low risk / high reward environment for human traffickers to operate in due to its ease of communication and anonymity
