Incarcerated **individuals** are released **each day** (Sabol, Harrison, and Minton 2007).

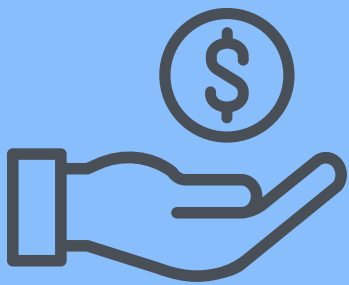

of parolees **successfully complete** their sentence (Solomon 2006).

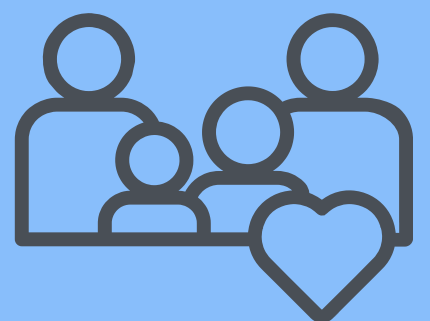


2 out of 3 are **rearrested** within 3 years (Sipes 2022).

PERSONAL BARRIERS TO SUCCESSFUL REENTRY



Reentering individuals struggle with obtaining stable housing, employment, healthcare services, and prosocial peer and family networks.



REENTRY COURTS

Reentry courts are one possible reform to our current system. These courts provide more support to individuals and connect them directly with social service providers.

Reentry Courts have been found to:

Increase education enrollment and job placement

Reduce drug use

Improve family relationships and emotional stability

HOW DOES THE PUBLIC FEEL ABOUT REHABILITATIVE SERVICES? DO THEY SUPPORT SPENDING ON REENTRY COURTS?

A SURVEY OF 169 ADULTS FOUND...

90.5%

of respondents support **reforming** our **current system** of managing reentering individuals.

97.7%

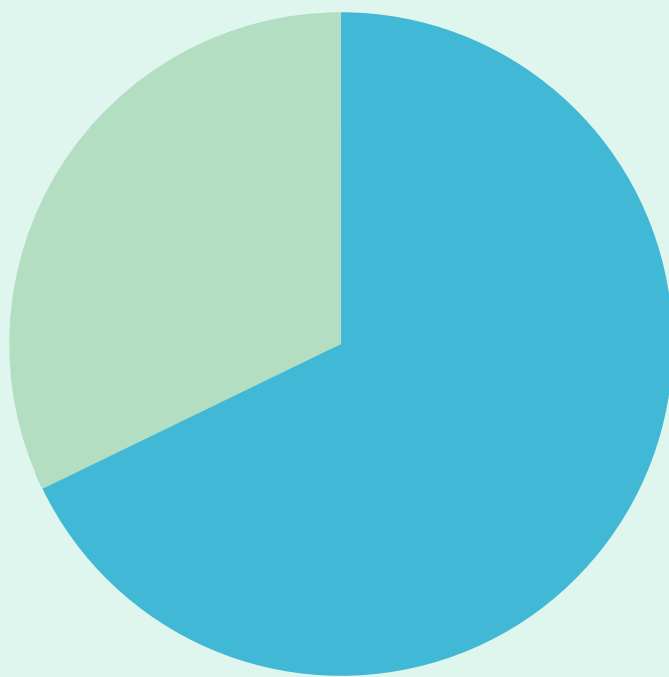
of respondents **agree** that our **criminal justice system** should have **rehabilitative programs** in place for recently released prisoners.

79.3%

of respondents believe **rehabilitative services** help individuals lead **productive lives**.
