COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an overview of the three major components of the American criminal justice system: police, courts, and corrections. Each component will be explored in its development over time as well as various issues surrounding each component. This course will also cover important issues that are relevant to current debates including reentry and juvenile justice.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After the completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the three subsystems of the American criminal justice system: police, courts, and corrections.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the major theories used to explain criminal and delinquent behavior.
- Examine how crime and delinquency are defined and measured in America.
- Identify specific issues of crime including offender reentry and technology and crime.
- Understand the future direction of the American criminal justice system.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Lectures

This course meets twice a week for lectures and once a week for discussion. Students are expected to attend all three sessions. During the weekly lectures, students are encouraged to take handwritten notes on the course material and keep up with the weekly readings.

Unless instructed to use as part of an in-class activity, **technological devices are prohibited** in this class including laptops, phones, gaming devices, etc. If these devices are seen and/or used during the class, outside of a required in-class activity, you will be given a warning or asked to leave class due to the disruptive behavior. Exceptions to this policy may apply if a student has a documented need and has obtained approval directly from me.

Discussion Activities

A weekly discussion will be led by a teaching assistant (TA). Please make sure you attend the registered lecture and discussion section listed on your schedule as no credit will be granted to students who attend a section they are not registered for this semester. Participating in discussion is critical to your success in the course. During your weekly discussions, you will participate in a variety of assignments (this may also include online assignments). Students will not typically need to take notes in discussion. Simply attending discussion will not result in full credit. To receive full credit, students will be expected to attend class on time, stay for the duration of the entire class, and actively participate in the discussion activities. Students who are not actively engaged in class or who engage in disruptive behavior may lose points in discussion.

If you are going to miss discussion due to an excused absence, please communicate with both Dr. Madoo and your TA **before the start of the missed class** so we can discuss an alternative. Documentation will be required. As a note, **two** discussion grades will be dropped for each student at the end of the semester; students do not need to provide prior notice of these missed classes.

Discussion will <u>not</u> be held during the first week of class so please start attending discussion in week two. Discussion will also <u>not</u> be held during exam weeks. Your TA will provide you with additional information on their discussion expectations.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be given in discussion throughout the semester which will provide opportunities for students to assess their comprehension of the course material. Quizzes will be unannounced and may be in the format of multiple-choice, true/false, matching, short answer, and/or essay questions. As a note, the lowest quiz will be dropped for each student at the end of the semester.

Exams

Exams given in class will be in the format of multiple-choice questions and will feature content from the assigned readings and weekly lectures. Exams will be completed without the use of notes, textbooks, computers, or additional aides. Exams will <u>not</u> be cumulative, nor will they be curved in the course.

If you have an excused absence on exam day, **please contact me before the start of the exam** so we can discuss an alternative. Documentation will be required to verify the excused absence. Since exams are considered major graded assessments, official documentation will be required to verify the absence; self-signed notes will **not** be accepted. Excused absences include religious observances, mandatory military obligation, illness of the student or illness of an immediate family member, required participation in university activities, death in the family, and required court appearances. Changes in employment schedules, personal travel, traffic/transit problems, miscalculating due dates, etc. do **not** qualify as excused absences.

In the case of makeup exams, the format and questions will be different from the standard multiple-choice version given to the class. These exams can include questions in the format of multiple-choice, true/false, matching, short answer, and/or essay questions. The content on the makeup exam, however, will be at the same level of difficulty as the standard version given to the class. Any questions about exam material must be emailed to me by 5:00pm the day before an exam.

*Please note that if you arrive late for an exam after the first person has completed and exited the lecture hall, you may **not** sit for the exam and will receive a zero.*
