This course provides an overview of the three major components of the American criminal justice system: police, courts, and corrections. Each component will be explored in its development over time as well as various issues surrounding each component. This course will also cover important issues that are relevant to current debates including reentry and juvenile justice.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After the completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the three subsystems of the American criminal justice system: police, courts, and corrections.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the major theories used to explain criminal and delinquent behavior.
- Examine how crime and delinquency are defined and measured in America.
- Identify specific issues of crime including offender reentry and juvenile offending.
- Understand the future direction of the American criminal justice system.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Lectures

This course meets twice a week for lectures and once a week for discussion. Students are expected to attend all three sessions. During the weekly lectures, students are encouraged to take handwritten notes on the course material and keep up with the weekly readings.

Unless you are instructed to use it as part of an in-class activity, **laptops and phones are prohibited** in this class. If these devices are seen and/or used during the class, outside of a required in-class activity, you will be given a warning or asked to leave class due to the disruptive behavior. Exceptions to this policy may apply if a student has a documented need and has obtained written approval directly from Dr. Madoo.

Discussion Activities

A weekly discussion will be led by a teaching assistant (TA). Please make sure you attend the registered lecture and discussion section listed on your schedule as no credit will be granted to students who attend a section they are not registered for this semester. Participating in discussion is critical to your success in the course. During your weekly discussions, you will participate in a variety of classroom assignments (this may also include online assignments). Students will not typically need to take notes in discussion. Simply attending discussion will not result in full credit. To receive full credit, students will be expected to attend class on time, stay for the duration of the entire class, and actively participate in the discussion activities. Students who are not actively engaged in class or who engage in disruptive behavior may lose points in discussion.

If you are going to miss discussion due to an excused absence, please communicate via email with **both** Dr. Madoo and your TA (in one email) **before the start of the missed class** so we can discuss a makeup option. Makeup assignments, including quizzes, must be completed within one week of the missed class. Official documentation will be requested/required after you notify us. If you are going to miss discussion due to an unexcused absence, you do not need to notify us as a makeup option will not be provided in these cases. As a note, **two** discussion grades will be dropped for each student at the end of the semester.

Discussion will **not** be held during the first week of class so please start attending discussion in week two. Discussion will also **not** be held during exam weeks. Your TA will provide you with additional information on their discussion expectations. Laptops and phones are also prohibited during discussions, unless instructed to use them as part of an in-class activity.

Quizzes

Weekly quizzes will be given in discussion throughout the semester which will provide opportunities for students to assess their comprehension of the course material. Quizzes may be in the format of multiple-choice, true/false, matching, and/or short answer questions. If you arrive late, after a quiz has been completed, you will not be able to take it. As a note, **two** of the lowest quizzes will be dropped for each student at the end of the semester.

Exams

Exams will be in the format of multiple-choice questions and will feature content from the assigned readings, weekly lectures, and weekly discussions. The first three exams will be held in person and will not be cumulative. The final exam, however, will be cumulative and given online during the final exam week. Please check the course schedule (last page) for the date and time of the final exam. Exam grades will not be curved in the course.

Makeup exams are **only** scheduled for excused absences. If you must miss an exam due to an excused absence, **please contact Dr. Madoo before the start of the exam** so we can discuss a makeup option. Makeup exams must be completed no later than 48 hours after the missed exam. These will be scheduled based on Dr. Madoo's availability. I am only able to accommodate students who inform me of their absence before the start of the exam, not afterwards. After you contact Dr. Madoo, official documentation will be required to verify the excused absence. Since exams are considered major graded assessments, self-signed notes will **not** be accepted.

Excused absences include religious observances, mandatory military obligation, illness of the student or illness of an immediate family member, required participation in university activities, death in the family, and required court appearances. Changes in employment schedules, personal travel, traffic/transit problems, miscalculating due dates, etc. do **not** qualify as excused absences.

In the case of makeup exams, the format and questions will be different from the standard multiple-choice version given to the class. Typically, these exams will be in the format of short answer and/or essay questions. The content on the makeup exam, however, will be at the same level of difficulty as the standard version given to the class.

*Please note that if you arrive late for an in-person exam, after the first student has left the lecture hall, you may **not** sit for the exam and will receive a zero.*
