## **Course Description**

This course provides a general introduction to the study of crime. Topics will include measures of crime, crime trends, criminological theories, and how theories are related to the criminal justice and public policy.

#### Exams

There will be three exams administered throughout the semester. Exams are noncumulative and consist of multiple choices as well as true/false questions. 2/3 of the questions are from lecture materials and 1/3 of the questions are from the readings. Please bring a #2 pencil, an eraser, and your University ID to each exam. Students arriving after the first student has completed the exam will not be permitted to take the exam. Exam grades will not be curved.

# **Class Participation**

Students are expected to attend class, keep up with the readings and assignments, and actively participate in all class activities/discussions. Per University Policy, you will not be graded on attendance; however, you will need to attend lectures in order to participate in class discussions. Full participation points can be earned by arriving class on time, actively listening to lectures and taking notes, participating in in-class activities, and asking/answering relevant questions. Points may be deducted for being late for class or leaving class early, sleeping in class, inappropriate use of technologies, not participating in discussions/activities, and/or being disrespectful towards the instructor or other students.

It is important for students to be courteous and respectful in class discussions. Students who engage in personal attacks, insults, aggressive and/or offensive language, or any other behavior that the instructor deems inappropriate will receive a zero for the day and be subject to referral to the Office of Student Conduct.

# **Writing Assignment**

One writing assignment will be given for you to apply what you have learned from this class to explain real world phenomenon. You will pick one real crime incident that happened after the date of Jan 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019, and apply two criminological theories we've covered in class to explain why the crime was committed. Your paper should be 3-5 full double-spaced pages with 1-inch margins and 12 point Times New Roman font. Detailed explanations of this writing assignment, a description of the research requirements, and a grading rubric will be posted on ELMS.

Please upload a paragraph about your chosen topic to the ELMS Dropbox by <u>11:59pm (EST)</u> <u>Wednesday, Oct 14<sup>th</sup>, 2019</u>. Your final paper is due on <u>11:59pm (EST)</u>, <u>Wednesday, Nov 20<sup>th</sup></u>, <u>2019</u>, and should also be submitted online to the ELMS Dropbox.

#### **Scheduled Ouizzes**

Four scheduled quizzes will be given throughout the semester. Quizzes are administered at the beginning of class. This is to assess whether students are keeping up with the readings. Each quiz will include 10 multiple choice and/or T/F questions. The quiz covers the reading materials scheduled for the quiz day and each worth 3% of the total grade. Only the three highest quizzes will be counted towards your final grade. Students have the option of using the dropped quiz for extra-credit, but students must inform me in writing before the last day of class if they plan to do so.

#### **Grade Disputes**

If you have questions or concerns about your grade(s) and believe I should review them, you must submit a written request over email that describes your concern in detail. This request must be submitted within one week after grades for the relevant assignment have been posted.

#### **Absences and Missed Class Materials**

Students are expected to attend class in order to obtain lecture notes. I will not post or share lecture notes/slides, recordings, and other in-class materials. If you cannot make it to lecture, it is your responsibility to obtain notes from your classmates. We can meet if you have any questions and/or would like to discuss materials for any missed lectures after obtaining notes from your classmates. However, this privilege is only given if you have notified me about your absence prior to the missed class.

#### Missed or Late Work

I have very strict policy regarding late/missed work. All make-ups are only given under cases of excused absences, which include illness with a doctor's note, death in the immediate family, required University activities, and required court appearance. Any subsequent absences would require official written documentation attesting excused absences in order to schedule makeup quiz and/or in-class activity. You must notify me prior to the missed lecture, and provide self-excusal note and/or written documentation before taking the makeup quiz/in-class activity

Exams and writing assignment are considered as Major Scheduled Grading events and therefore the self-signed honor statement does not apply to them. Make-up exams will only be given in cases of excused absences accompanying with official written documentation. You need to notify me prior to the exam in order to schedule a makeup, and provide written documentation before taking the makeup exam. All makeup exams must be completed within one week of the missed exam/assignment. Failure to adhere to these policies will result in a grade of zero for the exam.

Papers submitted after the due date will be accepted late up to five days after the due date. There will be a 10% penalty per day the assignment is late. Late begins at 12:01am the day after the due date. No projects will be accepted after five days past the due date.

I will not accept a Health Center honor statement to verify an illness. If you go to the Health Center and a doctor will not write you a note, you will need to get a copy of your medical record from them to verify your illness. I will verify all documentation of absences. If you are found to have fabricated documentation, you will be referred to the Student Honor Council.
