Course Description:

CCJS 332 is a one-credit course designed to assist Criminology and Criminal Justice majors explore and prepare for entering graduate school and/or the professional work world. Topics covered in the course include graduate school, law school, and potential careers for Criminology & Criminal Justice majors. Additionally 332 will incorporate job preparation skills including writing a resume, creating a cover letter, and preparing for an interview.

Masking Requirement:

President Pines provided clear expectations to the University about the wearing of masks for unvaccinated students. Course Expectations:

1. Attendance

CCJS 332 meets once per week for the duration of the semester. Students are encouraged to attend every class to absorb the material and network with professionals. **Students are required to complete 6** discussion posts based on guest speakers. **Students will not be able to complete these** assignments if they did not attend class.

2. Assignments

In addition to attending class, students are expected to successfully complete several assignments. Each assignment is worth a specified amount of points; students will be awarded points based on whether or not the work followed listed guidelines and is of high quality. Assignments for the PSYC 123 course cannot be used to fulfill assignments for CCJS 332. Doing so is self-plagiarism and is a violation of the honor code. Students using assignments from PSYC 123 to fulfill assignments for CCJS 332, will receive a zero on the assignment in CCJS 332. There is a strict policy regarding late assignments. All assignments are due at 11:59 PM (unless otherwise noted).

All assignments, unless otherwise stated, must be typewritten with the following guidelines:

- Font size: 12 point font maximum
- Font type: Times New Roman, Georgia, or similar font
- Grammar, spelling, and presentation will be factors in the grading of assignments
- PDF Format Required

Numerous assignments will be in the form of a discussion post. Once discussion posts open, you will have approximately one week to complete the discussion post. You must post your discussion post before being able to see other students' discussion posts. This is to ensure that you are sharing your own thoughts. Discussion posts are due at 11:59 PM, unless otherwise noted.

There are a variety of reasons why students may require an extension or make-up assignment. Students are required to give prior notification for any missed assignment with an excused absence. To give

notice, please email me directly at <u>EDoolin@umd.edu</u>. University-excused absences include: illness with a doctor's note, death in the immediate family, required University activities, and required court appearance. Please note the University medical excuse policy allows a student to sign an honor statement attesting to the illness once per semester. **The last day to turn in any assignment is May 4, 2021.**

The success of this course is hinged on, not only my ability to communicate ideas and concepts, but our ability to create an environment conducive to learning. We are fortunate to have a number of speakers from professional fields who will address our class. It is expected that students will treat each guest with courtesy and ask appropriate questions. If you attend class with a guest speaker:

1. Please do not engage in overtly disruptive behaviors (leaving early, texting, sleeping, etc.)

2. Please be responsive; this is your time to ask questions and network

Students should always feel safe and comfortable in the classroom. If you do not feel comfortable or safe with a guest speaker, please let me know at least (1) week before the in-class presentation.
