Course Description:

The laws concerning the medical use and legalization of cannabis are changing rapidly. This class attempts to analysis of the role of criminology and criminal justice in the understanding and control of cannabis use and abuse.

Approximately 2/3 of the exam questions come from lecture and class discussions and the remaining 1/3 come from the core text books. Exams are not cumulative.
