




Learning Outcomes

CCJS498V is an elective course designed to provide students with an understanding of the use of force by both public safety organizations and private individuals. Students will become familiar with legal decisions, legal concepts, policies, and procedures that are related to the use of force. Students will gain exposure to important human performance factors that can influence behavior and memory in force encounters. Research-based and practical-application approaches will be utilized in this class. After successfully completing this course you will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the laws, policies, and other legal aspects that guide the use of force.
- Examine various force responses, options, and levels of force.
- Evaluate training associated with the use of force.
- Examine human factors considerations in use of force.
- Demonstrate a familiarity with use of force in law enforcement, in corrections, by tactical teams, and by private individuals.



Activities, Learning Assessments, & Expectations for Students

This class will consist of class discussions, lectures, videos, written assignments, quizzes, guest speakers, and simulations. The assignments to follow in this syllabus are general instructions. See specific instructions for each assignment, which is highlighted in each section.

Submitting Assignments and Late Penalties

All assignments, to include quizzes and written submissions, must be submitted via ELMS. Assignments will only be accepted for full credit when they are received by the beginning of class on the due date assigned. For every day that a submission is late, 5% will be deducted from the total score (starting on the due date after the time deadline). All papers must be related to the assigned topic. All assignments must be the original work of the student.


Article and Video Analyses

Throughout the semester, students will be assigned four articles related to the use of force. Each article will be paired with a video that illustrates key themes discussed in the reading.

For each assignment, students must:

- 1. Read the assigned article.
- 2. Watch the corresponding video.
- 3. Identify one key theme from the article.
- 4. Explain how that theme connects to the video.
- 5. Evaluate whether the use of force shown in the video was reasonable.

Each article and video pair is worth 50 points, for a total of 200 points. Links to the articles are provided below. This is a summary only. Detailed instructions can be found in the document titled "Instructions for Use of Force Assignments" under the *Files* section on ELMS.





Use of Force Review Project

Each student will receive a Use of Force Packet, which includes:

- A written narrative describing a use of force incident
- A corresponding video of the incident

Students are required to:

- 1. Review the narrative and video
- 2. Answer a series of questions, applying the following:
 - o Relevant case law
 - o Gaithersburg Police Department Policy 600.1: Response to Resistance and Aggression
 - o Maryland Public Safety Article §3–524 (Maryland Use of Force Statute)

This assignment is worth 100 points. This is a brief overview—full instructions are available in the document titled "Instructions for Use of Force Assignments" under the *Files* section on ELMS.

Quizzes

There will be four quizzes, each worth 50 points. Unless it is an excused absence, there will be no opportunity to make up a missed quiz.

Participation and Attendance

Punctuality & Participation:

Use of electronic devices—such as laptops, tablets, and other portable technology—is permitted in class only for official academic purposes, including:


- Taking notes

Final Class Participation Requirement:

Each student is expected to be prepared for and actively contribute to the Use of Force Final Project discussion during the final class. Students who fail to participate in the final discussion without an excused absence will receive a 10% deduction from their total project score (e.g., the maximum score will be reduced from 100 to 90 points).





Absences & Excused Leave

Single-Class Absence (Medical)


Get Some Help!




